***Tammy Fiebelkorn, President of Positive Links,*** will discuss efforts to reduce violence against all family members, including animals. Animal abuse, cruelty and neglect were once considered isolated incidents wholly separated from other forms of family violence. Today, we know all forms of family violence – child abuse, domestic violence, elder abuse and animal abuse - are linked. Animal abuse is a sentinel indicator, “the tip of the iceberg,” and often the first visible sign of other family and community violence. Tammy will discuss the various ways we see animal abuse co-existing with other family violence and outline ways we can work together to reduce violence in our communities. Tammy will also discuss how to form community partnerships to reduce violence, review lessons learned in other communities from these types of partnerships and lead a discussion of possible partnerships for your community.

***Detective Robyn Gojkovich with the Dona Ana County Sheriff's Department*** will lead an extensive workshop on investigating criminal cases involving animal cruelty. Lack of knowledge, training and resources can lead to poorly handled animal cruelty cases which do not hold up in court. Despite the fact that animal cruelty is often an indicator of other violent tendencies, these cases do not always receive the attention they should. This training has the following objectives:

1. Define Cruelty to Animals and know the different types.
2. Identify the difference between a Felony and a Misdemeanor.
3. Understand the importance of processing and securing live evidence.
4. Define and understand the importance of Personal Protective Equipment.
5. Know the difference between Dog Fighting and Cock Fights.
6. How to charge someone with multiple counts of Cruelty to Animals when investigating a case involving numerous animals.
7. Understand important motions that must be filed in court and the proper procedure on filing them.
